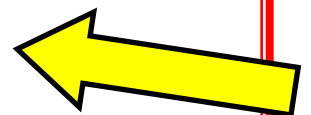

Craft – Tile Trivet – By Sandi Wingert

This craft is making a glass tile trivet all materials needed will be supplied and available for your use. The craft will cost \$6.00 for the materials needed to make your trivet. It will take about one hour to complete and may require additional cleaning of the tile surface after the grout has set overnight. This can easily be done with a damp paper towel, or cloth.

- We will provide a frame and back board for the tiles. (Left side on picture)
- You will select glass tiles and create your own personal design. (Center of picture)
- Grout the backboard and set tiles per your design.
- Grout between tiles and as grout sets clean excess grout from tile surface. (Finished trivet on right side of picture)

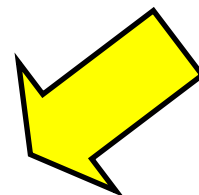
CAMPVENTION 2021 PARKING INFO

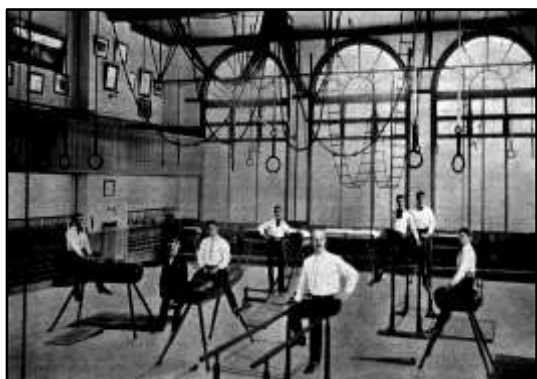
CEDARBURG, WISCONSIN

‘Wander Wisconsin’, the 2021 FCRV Campvention, offers many sites to visit within an hour or so of the campvention site.

Cedarburg, located about 70 miles from Elkhorn, is one of those sites. Like so many cities and town in early Wisconsin, Cedarburg began as a mill town with the arrival of German immigrants in the 1840s. Water-powered gristmills and woolen mills were built along Cedar Creek. As a community grew around the mills, Cedarburg was formed. As noted in research, the city was distinctly German into the early 20th century with several Lutheran churches, a brewery, a European-style spa resort called Hilgen Spring Park, and many German cultural associations, including two Turner societies.

Hilgen Spring Park, spa resort, opened in 1852, covering 74 acres of which about 30 acres were forested. The resort was a project of Frederick Hilgen, an early founder of the city. (Mr. Hilgen and William Schroeder built a wooden gristmill on Cedar Creek. After 11 years of operation, the wooden structure was replaced with the five-story stone Cedarburg Mill.) The resort sported two hotels, a bandstand, a spring & bathhouse, along with artistic flower beds and gravel walks. ‘By the 18180’s, it was visited by people from Chicago, St. Louis, and New Orleans each summer.



Turner societies? What were they? ‘Turners were members of German-American gymnastics clubs called Turnverein. They promoted German culture, physical culture, liberal politics, and supported the Union war effort during the American Civil War. Turners were the leading sponsors of gymnastics as an American sport and the field of academic study.’

During early days at Campvention 2021 in Elkhorn, WI, a day-trip to Cedarburg might be placed on your ‘to-visit’ list. The Cedarburg Visitors Center within the Cedarburg History Museum (N58 W6194 Columbia



Road) would be the suggested start of your visit. Learn about the history of Cedarburg and ask for suggestions of places to visit, especially local breweries and eateries. Unique shops, museums, breweries, wineries, and restaurants await you in Cedarburg when you ‘Wander Wisconsin’.

MENTAL HEALTH SAFETY

In this time when things are uncertain, and when our own state of mind is, experiencing difficult decisions as Covid 19-is spreading faster than one can grasp our topic this month is something many people just push under the rug. It will pass others might say. Mental Health is an issue that has only recently come into the forefront and many are truly finally beginning to understand and comprehend its reality. To add to this confusion, we are finally beginning to recognize the trauma associated with PTSD (Posttraumatic Stress Disorder) that has been around for centuries. For the time being PTSD will be a topic for a later discussion. The information presented here is not medical advice, it is only suggestions and its sole purpose is to be informative and educational. Mental Health is the topic of discussion. First, one needs to understand the definition of mental health.

RV INDUSTRY IN ELKHART, IND., HAS 4TH BEST YEAR IN HISTORY

Even with the shutdowns caused by the coronavirus pandemic earlier this year, it appears 2020 will go down as the fourth best in the history of the RV industry, [according to a report by Ed Semmler in the South Bend Tribune.](#)

Pent-up demand, the pandemic and long-term trends favoring the industry contributed to the surge, and that's important for the regional economy, as tens of thousands of people are employed at Elkhart-area businesses that either supply or produce most of the nation's RVs.

According to the RV Industry Association, factory shipments to dealers jumped 43.4% to 42,513 in No-

vember compared to the same month a year ago, and shipments for the year are up 3%, even with the shut-downs that lasted from six to eight weeks.

The shift from empty plants to full production caused whiplash for those who keep a close eye on the industry.

When the federal and state governments decided to shut down the economy, I thought ‘holy cow,’ and expected the worst for Elkhart County,” said former county Commissioner Mike Yoder, who will move into a new role as Bristol town manager on Monday.

“But then I started hearing from RV executives that there was still a lot of interest,” he added.

Indeed, plants moved into high gear as soon as they were able to reopen, trying to satisfy the heavy demand from dealers. The RV Industry Association is now projecting that about 423,628 RVs will be shipped from factories this year, and that 2021 could surpass the record 504,600 units shipped to dealers in 2017.

Monika Geraci, director of public relations and communications for the trade group, said the coronavirus contributed to the surge in demand as so many forms of travel were eliminated or limited during the pandemic.

“RVs allow the freedom to travel and the ability to do it in a socially distanced, responsible way,” she said, adding that demand for RVs was also boosted by the shift toward remote work that was instituted as a safety measure during the pandemic.

About 55% of RV purchases in 2020 were made by first-time buyers, which is more than double what is normal, said Geraci, and research indicates strong shipments and dealer sales should continue for the foreseeable future.

“We did a survey in mid-May that showed that 46 million Americans were looking to do an RV trip in the next year,” said Geraci. “We did another survey in November and it showed that 61 million aimed to take an RV trip in the next year.”

Even when concerns about the coronavirus eventually begin to subside, RV officials believe the move toward remote work will stick around to some extent and studies show that the RV lifestyle is attracting younger buyers who are attracted to the outdoor lifestyle.

And they’re not just kicking the tires; they’re buying.

According to the RV Industry Association, towable RVs continue to dominate the market as they’re generally more affordable than a motorhome and can be pulled by the SUVs and pickup trucks that have been gaining in popularity in recent years.

Tiara RV Sales in Elkhart, which specializes in towable RVs, has seen the same trends play out in 2020.

Jarred Campoli, a sales and marketing associate at Tiara RV Sales in Elkhart, said they’ve seen a larger-than-normal number of first-time buyers, who have been interested in RVs but were finally motivated to make a buying decision because of the pandemic.

“Sales about doubled this year,” Campoli said. “We consistently sell about 400 to 500, but we reached well over 800 in 2020.”

The industry’s rapid recovery is reflected in Elkhart County’s unemployment rate, which hit a staggering 28.6% in April but had already dropped to 4.4% by November as RV-related businesses might have helped absorb some of the job losses in other industries.

Despite his initial concerns in the spring, Yoder now believes the RV industry could help propel a faster recovery in Elkhart County and the region as its generating jobs and money that eventually will be spent at restaurants, hotels and stores.

“I know a lot of businesses have struggled,” he said. “The tunnel has been long, but the light at the end is pretty bright.”

DENNIS CAMPBELL PAST FCRV PRESIDENT



Dennis 'Denny' Campbell, Aurora, Colorado passed away on January 10 at the age of 81. He graduated from Fort Hayes Kansas State College in 1964. He was a consultant for Bell Telephone in Casper, Wyoming and transferred to Denver in 1969. He retired in 1985 as a Second Level Programming Supervisor.

The Campbell's first association with NCHA was in 1974 with the Rocky Ramblers Chapter. Along with his wife Jerri by his side, they were State Directors of Colorado starting in 1984. Denny served as 2nd Vice President from 1988- 1990, 1st Vice President 1990 - 1992 and as President from 1992 – 1996, then remained on the Executive Board as Immediate Past President until 2000.



The state of Colorado was praised for its membership building program which got prospective members to sign up at RV / Camper shows, then set up a get acquainted meeting where the activities of the organizations were explained. The newcomers were either absorbed into present chapters or started new chapters. This successful model was shared and copied by other States and Provinces.

It was also in the early 90's that concern about declining membership caused the Trustees to seek the use of The B.J. Thompson Advertising Agency, that concluded the name National Campers And Hikers Association did no longer reflect the true image of what had become more of an RV organization. It took considerable discussion and convincing among the Executive Board at several meetings, but under the steady leadership of Denny Campbell, agreement was approved for a new logo featuring a motorhome, campfire, and a tent. The new name, Family Campers and RVers was announced at the 1993 Campvention in Lebanon, Tennessee with Founder, Hank Nathan on hand,

Denny was looking forward to retirement and some travel, but life was interrupted when Jerri Campbell, his wife of 37 years passed away in 2001. He also lost his brother Terri. Denny continued to camp some with the Rocky Ramblers and was on hand for the chapter's ceremony to receive their 50 Year Certificate. He no longer had the motorhome, but eventually bought a small travel trailer and was able to camp with the chapter. He fought his way back from several times from serious health issues and was determined to see to see 2021, which he did.



His daughter, Denise said, "He was passionate about enjoying life to the fullest and could be found out camping or fishing when not at home. He was the most loving father, grandfather, and husband any family could ask for. He was a force of nature and his family meant more to him than anything else in the world, something he often mentioned. He was unendingly proud of his children, Derrick, Denise, and grandchildren, Cory, Cody, and Kenzie. "

Shari and Craig Weber said, "Denny's smile was infectious and his arms were always ready to share a bug hug. He will be missed. He's now around the campfire in heaven."
