VISIT JANESVILLE, WISCONSIN

As I am researching and writing this article about Janesville, about 30 miles east of the Campvention site in Elkhorn, the weather in so much of the country is a nightmare. But, in less than a month, spring will be here, by date but not necessarily in actuality. With the coming of spring, summer and Campvention 2021 will follow. With that in mind, let's explore another area which might be of interest to those who are planning on Elkhorn in July for our FCRV gathering.

Janesville, like much of Wisconsin, was inhabited by Native Americans when settlers from the East began to arrive. With their arrival, as in other areas of our country and part of our sad history, the Native Americans were removed, using the Indian Removal Act of 1830.

"American settlers John Inman, George Follmer, Joshua Holmes, and William Holmes, Jr. built a crude log cabin in the region in 1835. Later that year, one key settler named Henry F. Janes, a native of Virginia who was a self-proclaimed woodsman and early city planner, arrived in what is now Rock County. Janes came to the area in the early 1830s, and initially wanted to name the budding village 'Blackhawk' after the famous Sauk leader Chief Black Hawk, but was turned down by Post Office officials. After some discussion, it was settled that the town would be named after Janes himself. Thus, in 1835, Janesville was founded."

Interestingly, though the town was named after a Virginian, Janesville was founded by New Englanders, 'old-stock Yankees' descended from English Puritans. The completion of the Erie Canal in the east made travel west easier for New Englanders wanting to settle in the Northwest Territory, which included Wisconsin. With settlement, trades and farming turned into industry in Janesville. Flour and lumber mills were built along the Rock River which provided power for these fledgling industries. Foundries and farm machinery manufacturing resulted from the surge of agriculture. "After decades of rigorous grain farming, the soil quality around Janesville began to degrade. Farmers responded to this by planting tobacco, which became one of the most profitable and prolific crops grown in Wisconsin during the late 19th century."

In the late 1880s, a new wave of immigrants began to arrive; Germans arrived, seeking freedoms that were lacking in the Otto von Bismarck's German Empire. ("The 1880s witnessed massive immigration to the United States from all parts of Europe with over five million coming to America in that ten-year period.") In contrast to the hostility to the newly-arriving Germans in many other areas, the Janesville residents welcomed the immigrants.

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"One of the key developments in Janesville's history was the establishment of a <u>General Motors</u> plant in 1919. The plant was initially established to produce Samson tractors, a company acquired by GM co-founder <u>William C. Durant</u>. Durant was encouraged by Joseph Craig, the president of Janesville Machine, to build a plant to produce the Samson tractors in Janesville, to which Durant agreed. In the years following World War I, the demand for tractors plummeted and the plant shifted its focus to the production of automobiles."



"One of the most prominent turns of the century figures in Janesville was George Parker, who developed new pen technologies and styles and eventually established the Parker Pen Company. His developments included the 'lucky curve' ink feed system and the 'trench pen'—a pen commissioned by the U.S. Army for use in World War I. Parker designed and established a headquarters and factory in downtown Janesville. The Parker Pen Company was handed down to George's son, Ken, who developed the revolutionary 'Parker 51' in the 1940s. A Parker pen was used by Dwight D. Eisenhower to sign Germany's Armistice


agreement to end World War II in Europe, and subsequently General Douglas MacArthur used his 20-year-old Parker Duofold in the signing of Japan's surrender at the end of the War in the Pacific. The Parker Pen Company was one of the top employers in the area for over 70 years. The company was eventually sold off in a leveraged buyout in the 1980s."

With such a rich history, Janesville offers a glimpse back into that history at the Tallman House (440 N. Jackson St.) which was built by William Tallman with work starting in 1855. "It contained many modern conveniences of the time, such as central heating, gas piping installed for lights, running water, walk-in closets with built-in storage drawers and an indoor privy. The original cost was \$33,000. Additional work finished in 1870 brought the total to \$42,000. The 60 feet house has six floors and 20 rooms."



The residence was outstanding for the period, but there's another story. The Tallman House once hosted Abraham Lincoln! "Lincoln visited Janesville October 1–3, 1859, a year before he was elected president. He had come to Rock County from Milwaukee, where he had spoken at the Wisconsin State Fair. William Tallman drove to Beloit to convince Lincoln to visit Janesville and stay at the Tallman house for the evening after a speech in Beloit. Lincoln then gave a speech in Janesville on Saturday, October 1, 1859. He left his boots outside his room at William Tallman's house at night, as was the custom, and didn't find them there in the morning. Because he was embarrassed to leave his room in stocking feet, he missed his train, so Tallman invited him to attend services at First Congregational Church with the family. Lincoln then stayed overnight and caught a train to Chicago on Monday, October 3, 1859. Lincoln's stay at the Tallman house is the only recorded time he stayed in a Wisconsin home." Today, the Tallman House is Lincoln-Tallman House Museum; when in Janesville, consider taking the tour. (https://rchs.us/event/traditional-tour/)









magazine, gaining a national reputation. "The Janesville Coaster was advertised as the wagon that 'has more speed, gives the boys more fun. Keeps them out in the open, builds strong, nimble bodies and quick-acting minds. Runs so easily it makes play of hauling heavy loads of groceries, coal wood, ice, milk cans, etc.' But the depression hit and although 'Janesville Products' attempted to build a less expensive wagon, and even

produced a prototype of a pinball machine, the factory closed in 1940." In 1978, the wagons were



'resurrected' thanks to retired businessman seeking a special wagon for his first grandson. "Armed with a sketchpad he went to the community Historical Society and sketched an authentic Janesville wagon that was on display. 

WINTER TIME DISASTERS





Wow, what a winter this has been. Our friends in the south, especially in Texas have really experienced the harshness of the arctic cold this winter. This was harsh conditions for our Texan friends but our friends in the north, especially in Canada get this type of weather all the time. The bitter cold, freezing temperatures, power outages, snow, sleet and freezing rain are severe weather conditions that can put one on preparedness alert. Think about it, how prepared would you be for this type of weather conditions.

In these adverse conditions, the best thing to do is stay home and off the road-snow and ice do not create the best ideal driving conditions. Many accidents occur because people do not want to slow down. Under snowy or icy conditions, they just want to get where they are going-no matter what. With bad road conditions and the advice of your local authorities-if they say things are bad for driving, head the warning-stay off the roads.

Ice and snow will affect your living conditions. The snow and ice will accumulate on the power lines and nearby trees. Depending on the depth of both the ice and snow, it is possible



may not work, if it does work, use it for emergency calls only. You may not have battery power for extended periods and or have the ability to charge it up without electrical power.

Sometimes it is hard to find out how long one will be without the power. The longer the power outage, and especially in really cold and blustery conditions, it is time to take some other precautions. Here are some suggestions. Find that larger coolers you normally use for camping and fill it with water. If you do not have a larger container, use the largest pot or pans you have and fill it with water and cover it up. Yes, you can fill up the bathtub, too. Remember that without heat you have to be able to prevent the water from freezing. This is where the larger insulated containers come in handy as they may keep the water from freezing. Remember that the water stored in the bathtub may not be safe to drink, but could be used to help flush the toilets. In order to drink the tub water, you will need to boil it first. Need extra water and you have ice or snow outside, this could be melted and used for toilet purposes, but remember it is not safe to drink. Boil it first, let it cool then it may be drinkable. Ok, you have bottled water on hand for drinking; make sure you have a way to keep it protected from freezing. Wrap it up in some blankets, or newspaper to keep it warm. Newspaper is a great insulator.



Of course, without electricity, you have no heat. You have a fireplace; use this to heat your home or that one room in your home. In an effort to keep warm, close all the doors, or block off this one room so you can keep the heat in this space. Put towels at the bottom of the windows and place throw rugs or towels at the bottom of door to prevent the cold air from coming inside your home. Propane heaters, some can be used indoors, while others are unsafe in these circumstances, always check the manufactures directions for safe indoor operations. To prevent a power surge before the electricity comes back on go around your home an unplug

appliances, computers, and other electrical items that may become damage when the power is slowly restored. To prevent extra surges, go to your circuit breakers and turn off rooms of your home that you do not use to prevent electrical damage once the power comes back on. Once things return to normal, you can then gradually turn everything back on. As a suggestion for expensive electrical equipment, keep them plugged in to power surge protectors on a regular basis. You can have installed by a professional a whole house surge protector for extra protection to prevent damage to electrical appliances and such in your home. It does pay for itself when electrical outages of this type occurs.

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In a power outage, you can use a generator. If you are going to use the generator, place it outside, not in the basement or garage, as carbon dioxide is a byproduct of a combustible engine. Carbon Dioxide is a deadly gas commonly referred to as the silent killer. Sadly, many die because they put a combustible engine inside the house without thinking of the results. Some individuals have a household generator, if so, make sure it is in good working order and that it was installed correctly.

Need to cook, use that outside BBQ grill. This will help you boil water, or cook your meals, coffee and other nutritional items. The camping stove is always useful for this purpose but use it outside.

All of the above are some suggestions to use during a winter storm. In past articles, information for your "to go" kits has been provided on numerous occasions. In this case, because of the lack of heat, water, and electric you may have to go to a warning center. In this case, you are ready to go with your "to-go" kit to this safer location.

Disasters come in all forms-many are weather related and others are not. No matter what instance, it is always a good idea to be prepared. You just never know what may happen. The better prepared you are the better you will be able to handle whatever challenges you have to face.





- Jayco, Inc. (Jayco) is recalling certain 2021 Jayco Eagle fifth wheel vehicles. Certain vehicles were equipped with a 4 1/4 inch spring hanger instead of the proper 5 1/4 inch spring hanger, reducing the tire clearance.

JD POWER SPECIALTY VALUATION: RVS THRIVE DURING PANDEMIC

In the 2020 Year-End Review Recreational Vehicle (RV) Market Insights, analysts from J.D. Power Specialty Valuation Services say that used RV pricing increased overall as more consumers entered the RV market amid air travel restrictions. Used values are also being pushed up due to lack of new inventory.

"Every segment of our industry saw values increase in 2020, with most segments not seeing any seasonal pullback in values," said Lenny Sims, vice president business development and strategy at J.D. Power Specialty Valuation Services. "Standard hitch units brought 7.4% more revenue in 2020 than in 2019, and that gap widened in the second half of the year. Fifth-wheel units had already started the year strong before the pandemic hit, and the segment really took off as the year progressed, averaging 13.7% more revenue year over year."

Major findings in the <u>free quarterly report</u> note:

- Class C Motorhome used values increased at a strong, steady rate throughout the year
- Class A Motorhome used values decreased overall in November 2020
- Surge in RV traffic views in May 2020


