

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
From The President



Dear Members,

We wish to share some of our ongoing efforts in promoting marketing, membership, and recruitment.

As we continue to grow and evolve as an organization, it is essential to address the challenges and opportunities that come with change. Our organization's success and future depend on our ability to adapt and embrace new strategies that align with the current camping community. Our future depends on attracting a diverse range of members, including younger generations who bring fresh perspectives and energy to our community.

Recent data from industry leaders like Kampgrounds of America (KOA) and Recreational Vehicle Industry Association (RVIA) highlight significant changes in camping and the outdoors. Over the past decade, the number of overall camping households increased by 23%, while active camping households surged by an impressive 68%. This uptick in camping interest was further evidenced by the dramatic growth in households who venture out three or more times (98%).

Demographically, campers have become younger, with close to half of campers since 2022 being under the age of 35, compared to 30% in 2014. Additionally, the diversity among campers has increased, with 39% of enthusiasts being nonwhite compared to 23% ten years ago. Millennials and Gen Xers were the greatest percentage of new RV buyers in 2023, with the current median age of the new RV buyer being 32 years old. These reports confirm that attracting younger members is vital for our growth. We encourage every member to recruit new members and word of mouth has always been our best practice. Currently, our social media efforts are primarily on Facebook, targeting members aged 50+. We are also exploring other platforms to reach younger prospective members.

The Trustees, Regional Directors, and office staff created a Membership Team in the fall of 2024 initiating brainstorming sessions to create new ways to bring in new members. Look to future editions of Camping Today for updates and exciting new programs. Our modern marketing campaign is designed to ensure consistency and coordination with all FCRV regions and demographics. This strengthens our brand and enhances our ability to attract new members and commercial sponsors who are vital to our continued success. Focusing on just oneis misguided, unproductive, and contradicts the supportive community and principles of this organization.

We encourage all members to support these efforts and to understand the importance of a unified brand. By doing so, we can ensure that FCRV remains a vibrant and thriving organization for years to come. We hope this brings clarity and understanding to FCRV's focus. We also anticipate and appreciate members' commitment to the organizationand look forward to working together to achieve shared goals. If you have any questions, please reach out to any of us.



Spring has Sprung and the games team is looking forward to helping you spring into fun. At central registration there will be sign-up sheets for the different games. This allows for planning, but if you don't get signed up, just show up at the scheduled time and you will play.

We enjoy playing a variety of games. Rules for the games FCRVers enjoy playing are listed at https://fcrv.org/programs2/national-

programs/adult-activities/. Just click on the link to go to the information or copy and paste the link in your browser. Anyone with access to the internet can access this information. The games will be slightly modified to allow playing in the allotted time. Winners will receive their recognitions at the end of the games and also in an announcement from stage.

Outside games being played include Ladder Golf, Washer Toss, Cornhole, and Bean Bag Baseball. We have featured Ladder Golf and Cornhole in previous issues. Next month we will feature Washer Toss and Bean Bag Baseball.

Table games you have come to enjoy will be played. We will play Mexican Train, Euchre (if there are enough players), Card Bingo, and Five Crowns.

This month we are featuring two of the table games (Five Crowns and Card Bingo were featured in a previous issue).

Mexican Train is played with double 12 dominoes and up to 8 players per set of dominoes. Players draw 11 (7 or 8 players), 12 (5 or 6 players), or 15 (2 - 4 players) dominoes. Remaining dominoes are the boneyard. Play moves clockwise with the objective to play all your dominoes and have the lowest score after three rounds. Play begins with the first player playing his highest double domino. If the first player doesn't have a double play moves clockwise until someone can play a double. Play continues with players matching the number with their dominoes until one player has no more dominoes.

Euchre is played with a deck of 24 cards including ace, king, queen, jack, 10 & 9 in all four suits. Players are dealt 5 cards each. The remaining 4 cards are set in a pile next to the dealer with the top card face up. This is the proposed trump suit. Beginning with the player to the left of the dealer, players decide whether they can take at least 3 tricks in that suit. If that is possible the player "orders" the card into the dealer's hand. The dealer then puts that card in their hand and discards to leave 5 cards in their hand. Ranking of trump is jack of the suit declared (called the right bower), jack of the suit of the same color (the left bower), then ace, king, queen, 10, 9. Normal rank in the non-trump suits. Three tricks make the bid for one point. If the team takes all 5 tricks they receive 2 points. If the person who "orders" trump plays alone and takes at least 3 tricks they receive 1 point, if that player takes all the tricks 4 points are given for the "lone hand". Play goes until all 4 players have dealt twice. The team with the high score wins. If there are enough players for multiple tables the teams will shuffle and begin play again. The person with the high score is the winner and the person who achieved the most "lone hands' is also a winner.

The 53rd FCRV International Retiree Rally - New By Barb Turner, Rally Publicity Chair

The 53rd FCRV International Retiree Rally is 1½ months away! Are you registered? The preregistration deadline is March 1st to save \$25. The rally committee has a week of activities planned for you. The National Peanut Festival facility is rallyfriendly with full hookups. Activities, two dinners, ice cream social, crafts, games, entertainment await the attendees. Note: you don't have to be retired to attend!!

Over the last few months, various locations were shared as places to visit during the early days or going to/leaving the rally. In doing research, I discovered Attapulgus, Georgia which is a little over an hour southeast from Dothan. It's a very small town of less than 500 people. "The town's name is a Muscogee word meaning 'Dogwood' due to the abundance of attapulgite which makes up the clay soil throughout much of the Southeast. The mineral was named after the town. (Attapulgite is a magnesium aluminum phyllosilicate which occurs in a type of clay soil common to the southeastern states. When used in medicine, it physically binds to acids and toxic substances in the stomach and digestive tract. For that reason, it has often been used in antidiarrheal medications.)

"Attapulgus was the birthplace of civil rights leader Hosea Williams (1926-2000), who is said to have been run out of town by a lynch mob at the age of 13. He is remembered around the world for his close association with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., and for leading, with John Lewis, the famous march across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, in 1965 that led to the passage of the landmark Voting Rights Act of 1965. Williams served on the Atlanta City Council, the DeKalb County Commission, and in the Georgia Senate. He also started a program to feed the hungry that has continued long after his death." <u>https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Attapulgus, Georgia</u> In addition, Attapulgus is home to Elephant Refuge North America which spans 850 acres of gently rolling hills, lush pastures, dense forests, spring-fed lakes, creeks, and streams with a climate that allows the elephants to remain outdoors 24/7 almost all year. It is a perfect place for elephants to regain their 'elephantness' and develop loving bonds with other elephants and caregivers.

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Visit Nashville, Tennessee - New By Barb Turner

Attend Campvention 2025 in Lebanon, Tennessee AND visit 'Music City' Nashville! Thirty miles west of Campvention Nashville is easily accessed for exploring and enjoying.

Nashville, also known as Music City, was named for Francis Nash, a general of the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. The city was founded in 1779 when this territory was still considered part of North Carolina. It was a port on the Cumberland River and a railroad center. It was the northern terminus of the Natchez Trace, 440 miles from Natchez, Mississippi, linking the Cumberland, Tennessee, and Mississippi rivers. Tennessee became the 16th state on June 1, 1796. In 1828, Andrew Jackson was elected President of the United States from the state of Tennessee. Nashville became the state capital on October 7, 1843. Nashville as part of Tennessee seceded during the American Civil War in 1862 and was the first state capital in the Confederacy to be taken by Union forces. It was occupied through the war. After the war, the city gradually reclaimed its stature. It became a center of trade and developed a manufacturing base.

Nashville is known as 'The Music City'. How did that happen? The term intertwines with the history of Nashville. "The history of music in Nashville dates back to the late 1700s when the settlers celebrated with fiddle tunes after arriving on the shores of the Cumberland River. Nashville eventually became a national music publishing hub, thanks in part to the Fisk Jubilee Singers, an a cappella singing group made up of African-American singers who hail from Fisk University. Founded by the American Missionary Association, the predominantly black college set the goal of educating freed African Americans. In conjunction with this mission, the Fisk Jubilee Singers set out to raise money for the university.

"A theory regarding the start of 'Music City' involves the Fisk Jubilee Singers. During a tour of Great Britain and Europe in 1873, the group performed several songs for Queen Victoria. Among those songs were 'Steal Away to Jesus' and 'Go Down Moses'. After hearing the singers, Victoria was so impressed that she supposedly said they 'must be from the music city.' However, the Jubilee Singers' director, Paul T. Kwami, does not believe that story to be true, instead claiming that the name 'Music City' can be attributed to a radio DJ who referred to Nashville using that name. "The DJ that Mr. Kwami is referencing is David Cobb. In 1925, Nashville radio station WSM-AM, along with its broadcast, The Grand Ole Opry, was formed, and rumor has it that Cobb referred to Nashville as 'Music City' during a 1950 broadcast. Today, the Opry is America's longestrunning radio show.

"While either of these theories, or even both, could be true, there's no doubt that Nashville continues to be a city with a thriving music scene. Every day, live music is played in dozens of venues across town, boasting the sounds of music from every genre. Local, national, and world-renowned musicians grace the stages of these establishments, securing the city's reputation as the most musical spot in the South."

Dear RV

Does anyone else have problems with their RV refrigerator in the winter? Our fridge stops working when it is cold outside. This leaves us with a mess in the fridge.

This is a common problem with RV type refrigerators. Keep in mind that your RV fridge is an absorption cooling system, so the colder it is outside the less efficient it is in cooling. Reduction usually starts to go down around 25 degrees F and lessens as the temperature drops. I read that in cold weather using the propane setting will help as the waste heat from propane will help the unit function. Some cold weather packages have additional elements to the cooling unit to prevent the unit from freezing. Others say an incandescent light can be enough to avoid the problem. Another thing that will help is try to keep the cold wind from blowing directly into the unit with the use of a wind break protecting from direct wind.

Camping With Toddlers

Our family has always enjoyed the great outdoors, and have camped since our children were very young. We truly enjoyed helping them grow up with an appreciation for nature and wildlife, and now have the privilege of doing the same with our grandchildren.

Whether you pitch a tent, use a pop-up, or own a R.V., with a little planning and preparation, camping with toddlers can be a most enjoyable vacation.

I suggest the first few camping trips be kept short. In almost every state of the union we are lucky enough to have a myriad of wonderful parks and campgrounds close enough to spend just a weekend, any longer than that may become stressful for a little one.

We try to keep as close to a regular schedule as possible but improvise where necessary. If your child still takes naps in the afternoon it will probably be next to impossible to get him to go down when there is so much to do and see, but a few quiet moments cuddling on a towel in the grass guessing cloud shapes, or enjoying a swing or hammock from the comfort of Mom or Dads lap can work wonders, the child who goes nowhere without his Blanky can usually be cajoled into carrying it in a zip lock bag at the campsite if you explain he wouldn't want ants crawling all over it.

While I have used a small blow up pool with a bassinet mattress as a bed for my youngest before he could crawl, a portable playpen for larger children two and under works well, especially when we camp in a tent, as there is a danger of someone rolling over on a small child, or him getting tangled in the blankets. An adult sleeps between the child and the door, just in case a little one wakes up before anyone else and wants to go searching for adventure. We also attach a small bell to the door zipper.

In addition to a regular first aid kit, I bring an antiseptic hand cleaner, and use it at least once an hour whether the child's hands appear to be dirty or not. I recommend rinsing their hands with clear water or wiping with a wet cloth afterwards, as most toddlers continually have their fingers in their mouths.

An extra vigilant eye is necessary to keep a child from picking up and tasting new and unusual objects. Don't forget lots of sunscreen, and insect repellant, I prefer the spray on, it gets in all the cracks and crevices. Do not spray directly into the child's face, spraying on your hands and rubbing on his face works well, be extra careful not to get in or near his eyes and do not allow him to touch his face until it is fully dry Mealtimes can get a little hectic; usually one of us will take the little one on a nature walk while the other deals with the fire and cooking. Trading cooking and walking duties gives each of us special time alone with our special child. I use this time to point out animal or bird footprints, see how many different trees, bushes, and leaves we can find. Don't forget to pick some pretty flowers for the cook, if picking flowers is not against park rules.

We have found meals and snacks are best eaten a short distance away from the campsite. Little fingers drop or spill food and drink. All manner of insects and critters will come a-running to enjoy dinner with you, and you don't want to have a sleepover with them also.

Sugary snacks, roasting marshmallows, making smores; are best done several hours before bedtime. Trying to put a sugared up toddler to bed is close to useless, and a battle of wills can spoil the whole evening and leave the child with a bad memory of camping.

We find the traditional scary stories around the campfire are best told in a hushed voice after the little one is safely asleep, the older kids still enjoy getting the bejeebers scared out of them, without unwanted effects on the little one. The later it gets the scarier the story gets anyway.

While birds and small animals are most curious and hungry in the early morning, waiting until the child has had breakfast and has run off a little energy makes it easier to teach him to sit quietly so the birds and squirrels will come close enough to view and enjoy. It is important to teach all children early on not to feed wild animals by hand. As cute as they are, a wild animal will bite if frightened, and dealing with a wild animal bite is much more difficult than dealing with a nip from a neighbor's puppy.

My husband and I have truly enjoyed helping to open the outdoor world and all its treasures to every child we have had the privilege of camping with over the years, and we intend to be right here when the third generation of my family gets the camping bug.







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
