From The President





Most of our FCRV members are aware that the National Office sends out hard copy letters reminding our members that their membership dues are up for renewal. A reminder letter goes out two months prior to the due date, a second letter goes out just prior to the due date, and finally one goes out after the due date, stating it's not too late to renew. This is a drain on financial resources and employee time. As a group with a strong conservation focus, we can reduce our use of paper.

The office is adopting a slight change in the process of letting our members know that it's time to pay their membership dues. The "first letter" will now go out electronically. (Yet another reason why the office needs to have current emails for all our members!) Two months prior to a membership due date an email from the FCRV National Office (fcrvoffice@gmail.com) will be sent telling them their due date, and the available rates of renewal for one-year, two-year and three-year options. The message will also include a hot link to our payment page, making it all the easier to just click, fill out your information, and pay your dues, all in one sitting.

Don't worry, if you don't have an email, your inbox is full, (now might be a good time to do a little purging here at the beginning of the year) or your email is on the fritz, we will still send the second reminder letter and the last letter out via mailed hard copy to our members who need to renew in Family Campers & RVers.

FCRV is working hard to keep the cost of operations down. Utilizing the features of current technology is a great way to do that. And it's an excellent way to have a positive impact on the natural world around us.

There are three positions up for election in March. Those positions are Vice President Planning & Development, Comptroller, and Vice President Operations. There will be biographies with pictures and platforms in the February issue of "Camping Today". The ballots must be returned by April 15th. The newly elected Trustees will be installed at the annual meeting at Campvention in Lebanon, Tennessee. Their term will begin at that time.

Members of FCRV are entitled to one vote which is monitored by membership numbers. All memberships will receive a ballot for Vice President Planning & Development and Comptroller. The Executive Board and Advisory Council will receive a ballot for Vice President Operations. Ballots will be distributed by email. The email address the National Office has on file for your membership will be used.

Prior to March you should make sure your email is correct in the National Database. This can be done through your State/Provincial or Regional Director. If you are unable to reach these people contact the National Office directly. If you have blocked email from the National Office for any reason, this block will prevent the election email. You can unblock an email address by going to Settings in your email software, then Filters,(or Security & Privacy), then Blocked Addresses. Select the sender you want to unblock (fcrvoffice@gmail.com) and click Unblock selected addresses.




Past Conservation Director: Al Quivey

Sunday School with Jimmy Carter

Editor's note: While this event took place a long time ago, when we saw this family had visited Plains, GA and met Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter, we asked for an article on their experience. It is an honor to meet a Past President of the United States. We hope you enjoy reading this.

In 1998 we attended the National Campvention in Perry, Georgia. As was our normal plan, we looked over all the places we could visit while in Perry. Our son has always been a history nut so he pointed out that former President Jimmy Carter was from Georgia and lived in Plains, Georgia which was two hours from Campvention.

We headed to Plains on Saturday. Our first stop there was the General Store that you've seen on the news recently. It's the central meeting place in Plains. It had quite the collection of memorabilia and souvenirs for purchase. I still have the fridge magnet I bought that day. There was quite a selection of Billy Beers.

We inquired where Jimmy Carter lived and was there any way to see it. We were told there was a "tour" we could go on. A childhood friend of Jimmy's could take us. While we waited for him to show up we "enjoyed" some boiled peanuts and drinks. I liked the peanuts. The rest of the family didn't. When our guide showed up, he took us in his van on an hour plus tour of Plains. He talked a mile a minute. We have a video of the whole thing. He gave us a whole history of Plains, the industry before and after the Carter presidency, told us about the job he got with the news corp that set up in the town for the four years Jimmy was president. He took us inside the Carter compound. He was the only one who was cleared by the secret service to take people through. here are motion detectors and cameras everywhere and are monitored by the secret service. He was not allowed to stop, but he drove as slow as he could so Bob could keep taking his video.

We saw the house. Their cars were there. We learned that they had made arrangements to give all the property to the National Park Service. He told us how every weekend that Jimmy was there he taught Sunday School at the Maranatha Baptist Church. It was open to anyone who wanted to attend. It was a great tour.

On the way back to Campvention all I kept hearing from Jason was how we should go to the Sunday School the next morning. I told Jason I was not going to set the alarm. I didn't want to get up and out so early. If God wanted me to get up early to get back to Plains for Sunday School, he'd have to wake me. Well guess who woke up! We got there a half hour early for 10am Sunday School, and it was crowded. We got the last 4 seats in the back row. Boy were we underdressed! Hey, we were on vacation and not Baptist so we didn't know what we were in for.

We listened to Jimmy Carter preach Sunday School for an hour and that was followed by an hour or more service. After that was concluded, Jimmy & Rosalynn Carter went outside. The secret service set up ropes and an area for the public to form a line and each person got to meet the Carters and then pose for a picture with them. An agent took your camera and took one shot. It holds a place of pride in our den. To this day when I see that picture I recall Jason shoving my daughter, Melanie, out of the way so he could stand next to Jimmy Carter.

A wonderful man has left us. We'll always have this memory, and we gladly share it with you.

Games in Dothan - Update

Spring into games in Dothan, Alabama. There will be several table games at the rally in addition to outdoor games. All games can be enjoyed in a reasonable amount of time, allowing you to enjoy the other activities available.

This month we are featuring two of our outdoor games which draw eager players. Ladder Golf is featured this month. It is played with goals having three rungs, like a ladder. The player throws 3 golf ball bolas (2 golf balls joined with a nylon rope leaving the balls 13" apart) which are thrown from 15' from the goal. Players throw alternately with opponents. Scoring is achieved by wrapping the bola around one of the rungs on the goal. Points are scored 3 points for the top rung, 2 points for the middle rung, and 1 point for the bottom rung. At the rally the game is modified to allow play in a timely manner by having each player throw 10 times and accumulate their score.

Cornhole is a game played on two angled boards with a 6-inch hole in each placed 9 inches from the top and 12 inches from either side. The boards are 27 feet apart (older and physically impaired players may throw from 21 feet). Players stand on one side of the board and toss bags filled with corn toward the board opposite them. Points are scored for bags that go in the hole (3 points) and bags that stay on the board (1 point). We will have 10 throws for each player. We will switch ends after 5 throws. All points will accumulate. There will be first and second place awards. The retirees do not own these boards, so we ask that you bring your boards so we can play.

We have some good entertainment set up for you and hope you will all enjoy it.

Tuesday night, March 25, the "ONE MAN BAND" from New Orleans, Louisiana will be featured

Brian Belknap is a multi-instrumentalist and songwriter in the mold of Lucinda Williams and Townes Van Zandt. His music — a rough blend of broke-down folk, junk-country blues, and gutbucket gospel, rendered on accordion, slide guitar, and mandolin — is a product of the rich cultures of Chicago, San Francisco and New Orleans, all cities he has called home. Belknap's latest offering, In Lieu of Flowers, finds him in the capable hands of producer Mike Coykendall (M. Ward, She & Him, Bright Eyes, Blitzen Trapper). The record is about coping with loss (both personal and collective), and finding redemption in a world in its own time of reckoning.

A lifelong veteran of several music scenes, Belknap holds a special place in his music community. His real-life history indeed reads like that of a bygone era. Leaving a troubled home at an early age, he thumbed cross country making what money he could by playing on the streets. Finding factory work, he honed his skills practicing in boiler rooms and on loading docks during lunch breaks, organizing when he could against the horrible working conditions where he often found himself.

In the 90s, Belknap founded a band called Turpentine, during SF's heyday of folk, bluegrass, and country. Turpentine was soon sharing the stage with the likes of Cake, Calexico, and Train. He currently resides in New Orleans, performs as a One-Man Band and is the subject of an upcoming documentary by Director Adam Rifkin (Detroit Rock City, The Last Movie Star).

Visit Opelika, Alabama - New By: Barb Turner, Publicity Chair

As 2025 FCRV International Retiree Rally attendees, visiting Opelika, Alabama, about 2 hours north of Dothan might be of interest. Opelika, once known as 'The Trading Center of East Alabama', is situated at the juncture of the Piedmont Upland and East Gulf Coast Plain physiographic sections. Opelika means 'big swamp' in the Muskeghean language spoken by the region's Native Americans.

Following the Treaty of Cusseta by the United States and the Creek Nation, the first white settlers arrived in the area. "This treaty placed the land and all other Creek territories east of the Mississippi River under the possession of the United State government. Though the territory now belonged to the United States, Opelika kept its Creek name."

Settlement was slow until the late 1840s when Opelika quickly became a commercial center with the coming of the railroad, the Montgomery & West Point Railroad Company, which served as the major means of transportation for unprocessed cotton. "The town nearly doubled in size between 1870 and 1900. Downtown was packed with saloons catering to the railroad workers and other men. Gunfire in the street by intoxicated patrons resulted in the railroads directing their passengers to duck between the windows when their trains passed through town.

"In 1882, two factions claimed to rule the city government, one known as the 'Bar room' headed by Mayor Dunbar, a saloon keeper, and another known as the 'Citizens'. In a riot in late November–December of that year, a dozen men were wounded. In the end, a few were killed. The Citizens had claimed control of the city via the elections, but Dunbar refused to give up. After continued violence, the state legislature revoked the city's charter, and the governor sent in the militia to restore order.

The legislature appointed five commissioners to manage the city, a situation that continued until 1899. That year, the legislature restored the city's charter."

What to expect when visiting this historic railroad town.....

Walk the Train Tracks: Today you can see the historic railroad tracks and the freight trains that still run along them in downtown Opelika.

Hit up the Downtown Shops: There's a store for everything, from size-inclusive women's clothing and accessories (Studio 3:19) to new and used vinyl records (10,000 Hz) to home and gift ideas (Southern Crossing). After you've exercised your credit card downtown, take it for one final hurrah at nearby Angel's Antiques and Flea Market, which offers 68,000 square feet of one-of-a-kind finds.

Explore the Northside Historic District: The residential neighborhood is filled with beautiful turn-of-the-century homes that have been lovingly restored to match their original appearance. Take a stroll along the charming streets and marvel at their grandeur.

Go on a Street Art Scavenger Hunt: The walls of the town reflect Opelika's colorful past and a bright future with murals. Be sure to snap photos in front of the 'Bless You' wall, yellow umbrella, butterfly, and 'Greetings from Opelika' mural. Each is an Instagram moment waiting to happen!

Visit the Salem-Shotwell Covered Bridge: This enchanting bridge is known for its iconic lattice trusses and wooden roof is also known as the Pea Ridge Covered Bridge. The structure is one of only five remaining covered bridges in Alabama that dates to 1950 or before. Built in 1900, the bridge leads into the Opelika Municipal Park, where a mini train called the Rocky Brook Rocket runs seasonally and families often gather for play dates and picnics.

Flags will be displayed all week at the stage. The US Flag, Canadian Flag, and the FCRV Flag will be displayed on stage. State, province, and chapter flags will be displayed on the floor.

Opening Flag Ceremony Rehearsal will take place on Sunday late afternoon at the stage. Flag bearers should bring their flag, flagpole, and flag stands to the practice. The time of the Closing Ceremony rehearsal will be in the Program Book and will take place on Friday.









Visit Franklin, Tennessee, Where Future History was Influenced. - New By: Barb Turner, Publicity Chair

If history interests you, you might want to visit Franklin, Tennessee from Lebanon, Tennessee, site of the 2025 FCRV Campvention July 20-26, 2025. Franklin is about 50 miles from our Campvention site.

Franklin was founded on October 26, 1799, by Abram Maury Jr. He named the town after Benjamin Franklin; the town developed on both sides of the Harpeth River which is a tributary of the Cumberland River. In the 19th century, Franklin, as the county seat, was the trading and judicial center for primarily rural Williamson County and remained so well into the 20th century as the county remained rural and agricultural in nature. This area is part of Middle Tennessee, and farmers prospered in the pre-Civil War years with the cultivation of tobacco and hemp as commodity crops, and raising of livestock.

In 1796, Tennessee became the 16th state to join the Union of the United States. In 1861, it was the last to leave the Union, and in 1866, it was the first Confederate state to rejoin the Union States at the end of the Civil War. All of these dates are important but not as impactful as the one night when almost 10,000 soldiers were injured or died in a five-hour Battle of Franklin in Middle Tennessee.

"Pre-Civil War, Tennessee was divided, with western citizens on the side of the Confederates, eastern citizens firmly planted on the Union side, and Middle Tennessee citizens having loyalties to one or the other. The division was so predominant that there were two referendums on secession before entering the Civil War on the Confederate side.

"The cities of Franklin and Spring Hill are in the middle of the state, 13 miles apart. Carnton, Carter House, and Rippa Villa tell the stories of those fateful two days at the end of November 1864." Visit https://www.downshiftingpro.com/battle-of-franklin-trust/ to learn more about this period of the local history.





In 2016 the FCRV Travalong visited Franklin and discovered the historical events that occurred in the area. The Battle of Franklin on November 30, 1864 is little known but was a significant event.

To perhaps prepare, you might want to read The Widow of the South, a novel by Robert Hicks, based on the true story of Carrie McGavock. During the Civil War's Battle of Franklin, a five-hour bloodbath with 9,200 casualties, McGavock's home was turned into a field hospital where four generals died. For 40 years she tended the private cemetery on her property where more than 1,000 were laid to rest.

Carnton was built around 1826 by Randal McGavock, an early settler in Middle Tennessee. By the time of the Civil War, Carnton was home to John and Carrie McGavock, and it was a large working farm. Over forty enslaved people lived and worked at Carnton in the years leading up to the Civil War. On November 30, 1864, the site was witness to the Battle of Franklin. Carnton became the largest field hospital in the area following the terrible battle, and in 1866 the McGavock Confederate Cemetery was established nearby. Today the cemetery holds the remains of nearly 1,500 Southern soldiers. It is the largest privately held Confederate cemetery

in the United States. 780 of the soldiers' identities are known today, leaving 558 as unknown but not forgotten. The family and enslaved cemeteries are also on site.

The Battle of Franklin was one of the fiercest battles of the Civil War. It was one of the worst defeats of the Confederacy. 63,000 troops were involved. 30,000 Union. 33,000 Confederates. The two opposing forces stretching across two miles clashed in Franklin, centered around the Carter House. Visit

Two facts stand out for me. First, "several elements of the ensuing battle are worthy of comparison with Lee's assault on July 3, 1863. At Gettysburg, 12,000 Confederates attacked over a mile of open ground following a 150-gun bombardment of a Union line protected by a low stone wall. They reached their objective and held out for around thirty minutes before being

repulsed, leaving about 1,415 dead or mortally wounded on both sides. At Franklin, 20,000 Confederates, supported by just one battery, advanced over two miles of open ground and struck a Union line made up of three tiers of sturdy breastworks and abatis that in most places stood about eight feet high. The Army of Tennessee pierced the center of this line and held their position for over three hours, resulting in over 2,000 combined fatalities. Such bravery and ferocity so late in the war shocked and saddened many observers--Private Sam Watkins of the 1st Tennessee called it 'the blackest page in the history of the war'."

The second, "The course of World War II could have been greatly altered at the Battle of Franklin. Arthur MacArthur, Jr., 'The Boy Colonel', was a novelty in the Union Army. He had enlisted in the 24th Wisconsin Infantry regiment underage at the beginning of the war, but had already made an impressive name for himself. At the Battle of Missionary Ridge on November 25, 1863, as an eighteen-year-old first lieutenant, MacArthur had seized the regimental colors from a decapitated comrade and led the charge that broke a seemingly unbreakable line. He was awarded the Medal of Honor and promoted to colonel. At Franklin, now leading the 24th Wisconsin of Opdycke's brigade in the middle of the reserve line, MacArthur and his men, with a shout of "Up, Wisconsin!" plunged into the melee at the Carter House after the initial Confederate charge splintered the Union defenses. MacArthur was shot off of his horse almost immediately. Bleeding from the shoulder, he drew his saber and began cutting his way through the melee towards a ragged Southern flag waving above the fray, under which MacArthur came face-to-face with a Confederate officer. The Southerner leveled his pistol and shot MacArthur in the chest. MacArthur kept his feet and ran his opponent through, but the falling officer fired once more and hit MacArthur in the leg. Gravely wounded, MacArthur was nearly trampled before his men dragged him to safety. Miraculously, the young colonel survived his wounds and the war. His son Douglas became one of the United States' top generals in World War II and Korea. To this day, Arthur and Douglas are the only father and son pair besides Theodore Roosevelt and Theodore Roosevelt, Jr. to have won the Medal of Honor."





Plan on visiting Franklin, Tennessee, "a lesser-known but very enchanting Southern destination, complete with Civil War sites, elevated food and beverage offerings, unique local businesses, artsy hamlets, and so much more."





Dear RV,

We have our RV in storage winterized for the winter, but snow often will remain on the roof. A Chapter member said we should always remove the snow, and another said that it does not need to be removed. Who is correct?

Thanks for your input, Questioning

Dear Questioning,

I think in a way both are correct. Here is why I say that. It truly depends on the extent of the snow load. It is like your house, the roof is designed and engineered to withstand a snow load of a set amount. If the snow load exceeds the design, the roof will fail. Having said this, if you make it a point to remove every snow from the roof, you have the chance of damaging your roofing material leading to costly roof repairs. As you see, this requires a balance of action. I live in an area where we can have heavy snows. The snow can be light and fluffy or very heavy and wet. I only remove the snow when I feel the roof is in danger, a personal decision. You also must keep in mind that the roof WILL be very slippery, increasing the possibility of falls. I do encourage you to check your roof after snow or rain events. Thanks for asking Dear RV

Do I need to check my RV tires during storage? Wondering

Dear Wondering,

It is always good to check your tires when you have the rig in storage. There is nothing worse than going to get the rig out of storage and not being able to complete the task because of a flat tire. There is also the possible cost of replacing a tire that sat flat over winter causing extensive damage to the tire. I say check that they are not flat, covering them helps, according to some, from the elements and ensures that they are properly aired up before moving the rig.
