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

We will have the adult games in the morning and afternoon on some days. One of them being the Teens versus Adult softball game. We might need help with equipment needed for some of the sports or activities.

Our youth have many opportunities within our organization to show their personalities, develop character, learn about conservation, and enjoy wildlife. We can recognize our outstanding young active members through The Youth of the Year award. This is a national contest based upon a child's participation in both FCRV and non-FCRV related activities during the previous year (May 1 – April 30). The award is judged on the all-around participation of the entrant. The nominated child's parent(s) and/or legal guardian(s) must be FCRV members. You can find the nomination form on the youth program page of the FCRV webpage (https://fcrv.org/).

The youth of FCRV also have an opportunity to express themselves through art in defining what camping means to them in the "Camping Is" contest. The contest is divided into 6 age groups; 0-2 years, 3-4 years, 5-6 years, 7-8 years, 9-10 years, and 11-12 years. The 0-2 and 3-4 year olds will have a coloring contest with an official entry form unique for each year. This year's coloring page can be found in this month's Camping Today as well as on the FCRV webpage (fcrv.org). The other age groups will have a poster contest.

Beginning this year, ALL entries created should be forwarded to the national level.

Each entry turned in should be identified as "Camping is..." so as to not be confused with Conservation Poster entries (which have different rules/ages). The child's identifying information is written correctly and legibly on the back left corner of the poster/coloring page. Be sure the following information is included: Name, First and Last, City and State/Province, Birthdate in mm/dd/yyyy

format, Age as of July 1 in the contest year, Local chapter name if applicable, along with Field Director's or State/Provincial Director's certification of FCRV membership.

At your spring campouts, please encourage participation in the contest by having poster board, markers, crayons and copies of the coloring page available at the campout. Perhaps set aside some time at the campout for the children to create their posters or complete the coloring page. If your state/province has a program or schedule, adding the poster making to the schedule can help increase participation. We would like all entries created to be forwarded to the National Campvention.

I hope you take the time to encourage your youth to participate in both the "Camping Is..." as well as the Conservation contest. While the "Camping Is..." is limited to 12 and younger, the Conservation Poster Contest is open to all ages. So while the youth are artistically expressing themselves, you should be too! Also, please consider completing a Youth of the Year nomination by July 1st.

Are you still thinking about coming to Lebanon Tennessee in July? We have room for you so make plans, get your registration in and come. We have some fun things planned for the week and a light day planned on Wednesday for you to go sightseeing. You can find tour opportunities in Camping Today. We have our normal activities planned and good entertainment. Something else that has changed this year is the Parade, it will not be judged this year. We are having most Hospitalities on one night. 

Disc Golf was again "tossed" into the schedule; perhaps we can get even more interest in Tennessee? These two activities will be available on-site providing easy access for everyone's enjoyment. PLAN AHEAD FOR THE FOLLOWING ACTIVITIES:

PADDLING: within the nearby Stones River Greenway is one option that we have been researching. We have reached out to a local outfitter regarding rentals and trip support. Once we can confirm the details, we will update anyone interested. Please note that this year's organizers don't have any local knowledge of the area so if anyone does, please reach out. It would be appreciated.

BICYCLING & E-Biking: Stones River Greenway offers the most convenient "bike trail" near Campvention, and we plan to visit and ride there. We are also looking into other options. Please note that this year's organizers don't have any local knowledge of the area so if anyone does, please reach out. It would be appreciated.

DISC GOLF: This activity is intended to introduce all attendees to this fun outdoor sport. If you've ever tossed a frisbee or considered it, this activity is for you. No experience necessary! Equipment provided; however, if you own a set of disks or a portable target/basket, please bring them along to Campvention. The scramble play will be similar to regular golf. Participants will play as teams with each member tossing one disc at the same target.

The team will then toss from the spot of the best toss and so on till a team member lands inside the target. This way everyone can enjoy the game regardless of ability. This also makes for a great ice-breaker since we usually play with teams of ten. By the end of the round (9 baskets), you will have discovered some new friends and had lots of fun.

Note: If there appears to be enough interest, there may be an opportunity to travel to a nearby public course where we can really test our skills.

PICKLEBALL: A game for ALL ages and abilities! If you're just interested or a veteran player, add this activity to your Campvention schedule. The committee has a limited amount of equipment, (We have enough for two courts). The on-grounds event location is currently being determined which should accommodate more courts. Please bring gear (paddles and balls) if you have them, and any additional nets would be appreciated!

DAILY: Fairground morning WALKING: Starts 8am at a TBD location. All are welcome tojoin this group walk as we get our day started together. In addition, just to change things up a bit and if you want more opportunities to stay fit, a PERPETUAL walking/running route through the fairgrounds is planned. (This honor system activity allows attendees to follow a designated route at their leisure. A sign-up ledger location will be posted near the information center where you can indicate your daily progress. This activity takes place from 8am-8pm and will extend from Saturday (second early arrival day) to noon on Friday. Consider this a challenge to keep moving with the FCRV C.A.M.P. program at your own pace.







Seminars Planned for Campvention - New By Pat Wittmeyer, Campvention Seminars Chairman

Seminars begin on Monday morning, when we will have our national VP-Operations, Linda English, and Past National President, Shari Weber, do a session on the updates which have been incorporated into the national Field Manual. They will also cover how to access the field manual which is contained at www.fcrv.org. This would be a great session for anyone who holds a volunteer job within FCRV to attend and learn about our current practices within the organization.

Later on Monday afternoon we will have a presentation by Niki Palmer, from Skymed, a firm which provides a variety of medical transportation services for members while on the road, including international transportation. Later in the week, Wednesday, Skymed will do another session in the morning and will include breakfast for attendees.

With FCRV Marketplace taking place on Tuesday morning, our seminars resume in the afternoon, with a lunch program from MASA. Some options with MASA include Emergency Transportation (Ground and Air), Patient Return, RV/Vehicle Return, along with a new plan which includes selections for domestic and international coverage. During lunch they will share information with attendees regarding the services offered through their program.

The next session taking place will be on Tuesday afternoon and will feature a square dance instructor who will present an overview of square dancing, then break attendees into groups of eight to learn actual steps like Do-Si-Do and Grand Allemande.

Wednesday will begin the day with a continental breakfast from Skymed for those who may not have been able to attend Tuesday's session. Since Wednesday is scheduled for sightseeing trips, there will be no seminars scheduled for the rest of the day.

Thursday will start with a focus on FCRV Conservation and Wildlife Programs. National Wildlife Chairs Tom and Cheryl Martinez are working with the Seminars team to bring in an animal guest or two for a late-morning seminar. The animals will then move into the Ambassador Circle luncheon. Then our National Disaster Awareness and Safety and Training (D.A.S.A.T.) Director Joe Boswell will run a seminar on Thursday afternoon entitled "After the Dust Settles" and will focus on what to do in the aftermath of a challenging event, whether natural or man-made.

Conservation Directors Mike and Carol Burns will present a conservation-based session after lunch on Friday, and Joe Boswell will have a second D.A.S.A.T. presentation after that titled "Counting to Ten", which will feature information on how to react and respond to a crisis in a calm and effective manner.

All seminars are scheduled to take place in the ED Building, East side. Chairs will be provided, and the building has air conditioning. Additional content about each seminar will be included on a special seminar page in the Campvention Program Book.








Entertainment Announced - Repeat By Connie Black, Entertainment Chair

Monday night entertainment - Jeffery Steele
Jeffrey Steele is an American country music singer
and songwriter. Along with recording his own
material, Steele has become a prolific Nashville
songwriter, having co-written more than 60 hit
songs for such artists as Montgomery Gentry, Tim
McGraw, Faith Hill, LeAnn Rimes, Rascal Flatts,
Billy Ray Cyrus, and others.

Between 1990 and 1996, Steele was the lead singer and bass guitarist in the country music band Boy Howdy, which recorded two albums and an EP on Curb Records, in addition to charting seven singles on the Billboard country music charts. After Boy Howdy disbanded, Steele embarked on a solo career, recording seven studio albums (one of which was not released). He also charted four singles as a solo artist, with the highest-peaking ("Somethin' in the Water") reaching No. 33 on the country charts in 2001.




The Eldorado Band is a rockin' country band with powerful vocals, blazing guitars, honky-tonk piano, and a tight rhythm section.

After distributing some demo songs, the group was picked up by producer Richard Chycki, who has worked with Aerosmith, Dream Theater, Gotthard, and Rush.



Dear RV

How do I clean out my black waste water tank so the sensors work? Always shows 1/3 full and sometimes 2/3 when not that full.

This is a subject that every RVer struggles with at one time or another. Oftentimes we learn our rig and just know when the tank is full. This is not a good solution as we end up overfilling the tank or dumping way too soon. So, some of the things I do are. If I am going to have full hookups at the next campground, I add 1/4 tank of water to the tank, and as I travel this will slosh around helping to clean the tank. Another thing that will help is a good tank cleaner. Add to the tank filling the tank according to directions. After soaking for the required time, flush the tank and repeat if necessary. I use a product made in Arvada, Colorado. Another thing I recommend is to use a good tank treatment that digests the paper and waste. Always flush the tank well after dumping. This will go a long way in helping your sensors to work.

Dear RV

How often do we need to check our roof?

I recommend that you check your roof at a minimum every spring and fall. Just a rule of thumb. Oftentimes one will find a joint that needs to be sealed in the spring from the winter temperature changes causing cracking of the caulking.

If you are in a campground and your rig comes in contact with tree branches, it is important to make a quick check to ensure that you do not have any roof damage from the tree branches rubbing across the roof. Give it a quick check and avoid water damage. It is well worth the time.
