












Pumpkin Carving Contest.




Following the trick-or-treating, everyone gathered inside the Hall for the **Costume Parade and Contest**. Shown above are 4 photos of the many excellent costumes.

Currently there is \$19, 314.55 left in the GIC. It will renew itself on Dec. 15, 2025 for another 18 month term but Dave suggests reducing the term to allow access to the funds sooner.
