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

# **National Office Update**



A long-term initiative to reduce operating costs by several thousand dollars annually through the elimination of postage, mailing supplies, paid software, postage machine licensing, and associated labor has been underway throughout 2025. This transition represents a key step toward ensuring FCRV's financial sustainability.

Earlier this year, FCRV began shifting from three physical renewal reminders to a blend of mailed and electronic notices as part of our testing phase for updated systems and processes. One reminder has already been converted to email, and a second will move to electronic delivery in January. We plan to continue this gradual, phased transition until all three reminders are fully electronic. This approach gives members time to adjust while allowing us to collect and update email addresses as needed. It is important to ensure that your email address is up to date with National. If you are unsure, you can always reach out to your State, Provincial, or Regional Directors to verify and update it.

Beginning with the November end-of-month cycle, members will also start receiving their Proof of Membership letters electronically. During this testing phase, hard-copy letters will continue to be mailed; however, once we are confident that the electronic process is functioning reliably, we anticipate discontinuing the physical mailings and moving to a fully digital method of providing Proof of Membership letters.

While this transition represents a critical advancement toward greater efficiency and sustainability it is important to recognize the trade-off involved. The personal, human element that has long characterized our membership interactions is inevitably diminishing. I encourage leadership at all levels to remain mindful of this shift and to take a more active role in engaging directly with members, ensuring that the organization continues to provide the warmth and personal connection that define the FCRV community.





# **Update: FCRV National Comptroller**



**Update: FCRV National Comptroller**

My name is Sandi Wingert. I am the Comptroller for FCRV. I am in charge of keeping the financial records on a monthly basis. Additionally, a few other people and I are responsible for overseeing our reserves.

With so little income, we the Trustees, have cut almost all our expenses to the bare minimum and eliminated unnecessary expenses. Keeping the books up to date and accurate has been simplified.

I formed an advisory investment committee along with Gerry Pfirsch, and we meet about every two months and review our investments and make changes as necessary. There are 3 accounts at Fidelity which are funds for Scholarship, funds for Wildlife, and funds for our corporate account. These three accounts are separate accounts and can not be mixed together. All the funds in the three accounts are in Mutual funds and with no single stock investment. There is a lot of research done to pick the mutual funds we are currently in. We are working together to make the funds work for us. To date, we are making money on our investments. I, unfortunately, have to pull money out of the corporate account to keep paying our expenses that our income does not cover.

Even if we had a magic wand, we would run out of the reserves. This is the main reason we must raise our annual dues. In addition we need to recruit new members, seek other sources of revenue, and promote Family Campers' programs through the new Project Keystone.

# **Hank Nathan International Scholarship 2026**

How to Apply: Applications for scholarships opens on December 15th and is posted in our Camping Today Issue. @ https://fcrv.org/hank-nathan-ncha-fcrv-scholarship/. Applications will only be accepted online at the above address. The application MUST include the FCRV member holder's name, membership number, postal mailing address, and most importantly, an email address at which the applicant can be contacted. Pay special attention to the entire website and follow the directions closely.

Section 1, Must be filled out by all applicants. Section 2, Is only for applicants graduating from high school this year and applying for a scholarship for the first time.

Section 3, Is only for applicants currently enrolled and continuing their college education.

Section 4, Applies to those returning to school for continuing or advanced education.

Eligibility Requirements: Parents, guardians, or applicants must be members of FCRV for 18 full calendar months or longer. Applicants must be enrolled, or accepted, into an accredited undergraduate, graduate, or trade school course of study. Part-time and trade school students must carry an equivalent to a minimum of six credit hours. You will be evaluated accordingly. Applicants should have a minimum 2.3 GPA (grade point average) on a 4.0 point scale. All applicants are given equal consideration. A current, complete official transcript of grades must display student name, school name, grades, credit hours for each course, and terms in which the courses were taken.

**Recommendations:** Two online recommendations are required and must be from a non-relative.

Both may come from any FCRV member including trustees, regional director, state director, or non-elected member. Your second recommendation may come from a school official, coach, band director, club

supervisor or an immediate supervisor if you are working. Your application will be complete when all required materials are submitted electronically on or before May 1. Scholarships are for one year. Recipients may reapply each year they meet the eligibility requirements.

\*If you've already submitted four letters of recommendation from 2 previous scholarship applications, those are still on file, and you do not need to submit any additional ones unless you want to include an update to your file.

#### **Scholarships**

Annual Scholarships are non-competitive. That means there is no competition between applicants.

Each applicant's score is individually tallied. A scholarship will be awarded to every applicant who meets the standards determined in advance by our rating scale. Scholarship values will range from \$1,000 to \$4,000+ (American).

Consideration is taken for GPA (Grade Point Average), maturity, leadership, related activities, and goals of the candidate as based on the objectives of FCRV.

Special consideration is given to applicants who major, minor or explore elective classes in fields related to forestry, conservation, wildlife, ecology, or outdoor education training.

The Board of Directors will announce the recipients at or after the Annual General Meeting held at Campvention. All scholarship recipients will be posted in Camping Today so that the members who donate to the scholarship fund can see who is getting an FCRV Scholarship.

Applicants will be notified in writing as to the amount they will receive along with further instructions after the May 1, deadline.


The positions to be elected are International President, VP Programs and Recording /Correspondence officer all of whom are elected by the membership.

If you cannot participate in electronic balloting and will not be at your membership residence on file with the office, absentee ballots must be requested by January 15, 2026 indicating the alternate address. 





#### **Harvest Cobbler**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

3# granny Smith apples, peeled, if desired and cut into thin slices

2 bags fresh cranberries, rinsed and drained 1-2 c raisins

½ c instant tapioca

White or butter pecan cake mix

Cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, cloves – use small amounts of any or all

Brown sugar

1 stick butter, cut into 8-10 squares

Cast iron Dutch Oven (DO) – 12"

Charcoal

Tripod for hanging pot



#### **DIRECTIONS**

Place 24-30 briquets into a chimney and light.

Line the DO with heavy duty foil. Mix apples, cranberries and raisins together in the DO and then gently add the tapioca into the fruit. Dust fruit with your choice of spices. Pour DRY cake mix over the top, covering the fruit completely.

Additional spices can be added on top of the cake mix, if desired. Sprinkle brown sugar over the top of the cake mix – not too much! Place butter squares strategically on top of brown sugar.


Cover.

Suspend the DO over a grate or fire pit. Place 6-8 hot coals beneath the oven and spread 12-18 evenly over the top. Cook for 1 hour, turning the lid ¼ turn every 15 minutes to prevent burning from hot spots. Replace the coals on top and bottom as

needed.

Serve with ice cream, whipped cream/topping, drizzle with caramel sauce, etc, etc. This recipe won 1st place and the grand prize in a campfire cooking contest put on by the Milwaukee Journal/Sentinel back in 2004 (?)

It was enjoyed every Thanksgiving at the dinners we served for our campers at Frog Hollow Campground.




#### **Black Pines Animal Sanctuary** 2025 Wildlife Grant

#### Wildlife and Ecosystems

Wildlife depends on and affects ecosystems in various ways. What is wildlife? All undomesticated animals, plants and organisms. What is an ecosystem? A community of interacting organisms and their environment.

Many believe we have to maintain and recover land for wildlife, and we do. However, wildlife's role is to maintain the ecosystem in which it lives. Animals like bees, bats, birds and other pollinators aid in plant reproduction and biodiversity. Seed disbursement is done by birds, mammals and insects. These eat the fruit and excrete the seeds elsewhere for regeneration. Predators like birds of prey, snakes, and ladybugs help control rodents and insects. Wildlife helps keep predator-prey stable. Some animals create or modify habitats. Wildlife supports human survival in clean water, oxygen, medicine, food and climate regulation.

Iceland is the safest county in the ENTIRE world! Yes, there is some crime, but very little and mostly targeted at tourists and perpetrated by gangs from outside the country.


So, I would like to tell you about my trip to Iceland. It will take me several articles, each highlighting a different subject, the first of which will be the weather.

#### Winter Sowing

I am excited to share a conservation article this month. Last spring our county conservation office offered a class on "Winter Sowing". I did some research prior to attending the class and was excited to learn this method of starting seeds that did not require a lot of space and equipment. This has turned out to be very successful for starting seeds planted at the beginning of the Winter Solstice. For reference, I live in Zone 6a.

After class, which was at the end of March, I planted more than 30 individual greenhouses using one-gallon clear plastic milk/water jugs, potting mix, and seeds that I typically purchase from the Baker Seed Company. I had almost 100% success with everything I started, both vegetables and flowers for our pollinators and honeybees.

I shared this method during our state fall campout in September. I created the handout linked below which provides detailed information of this process. Try it during a campout next year! It was fun and very well received!

Reading about Bill Stirewalt's experience at the Senior Games has inspired me to write about my own experiences at something called the World Senior Games, held each year in St. George, Utah. Started by Daisy and Jon H. Morgan in 1987, the Games received primary sponsorship by the Huntsman Corporation in 1989, and became an invitation to the world's senior, or Master Level as we sometimes like to call ourselves, athletes to convene and compete in an environment of strong competition, and expansive friendships. Teams come from all over the world, and I have competed against teams from Mexico, Brazil and Germany, as well as a variety of US teams. For anyone who has attended these games over the span of time, friendships are formed, strengthened and shared so much that it is truly impossible to walk the length of the convention center where 15 courts were set up, without being stopped six or seven times by friends and acquaintances you have met in past years. This year was a little different, but still a very enriching and enjoyable experience.

Since my own volleyball team from New York was initially uncertain about participating in this year's event, I put my name on the Team Selector Board, where those teams looking to add to their roster could contact and talk with potential members. Selected to participate on a women's 65+ volleyball team from California, I agreed to not only join the team, but to share a temporary rental home with them as well. What a marvelous experience! I not only reduced my own housing expenses for the week, but there is an innate factor in rising every morning and sharing a cup of

tea or coffee, sharing plans for lunch on the run, and cooking dinner together each night which builds that sense of team which is essential to successful competitions.

Our captain not only successfully put together a players variety of from vastly different backgrounds, she was also a professional chef! We were treated to pot roast in a slow cooker; a true Mexican dinner of beef, chicken, real Mexican sauces from scratch, veggies, tortillas and burritos; steak and eggs for breakfast; and on the final night, a slow roasted filet mignon with all the trimmings. In a naïve attempt to help, I walked into the kitchen on the first night and was promptly scooted out with instructions to "Set the table or something, I'm taking care of the food". And every bite was an experience. Thank you, Chef Patsy!

Our volleyball began with eight games on the first of four days of competition, intermingled with "working" where we provided line judges, a second referee (me!) to assist the paid official, and people to track the scoring on official forms in case there was a question regarding any of the protocols as the game moved along. The second day was much the same, where we competed in a pool with eight other teams, facing off against each other to determine our rankings. On the third day, our longest by far, we played well into the evening, having moved from pool play into "bracket play" where we were now fighting for playoff contention. Interestingly enough, we came up against my own New York team, where there was surprise and ribbing about my loyalties. California defeated New York on Monday, only to be defeated by them on Tuesday. That longest day of competition resulted in sore knees, tender hips and a lot of ice bags going around the house that night, but an
