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From The President



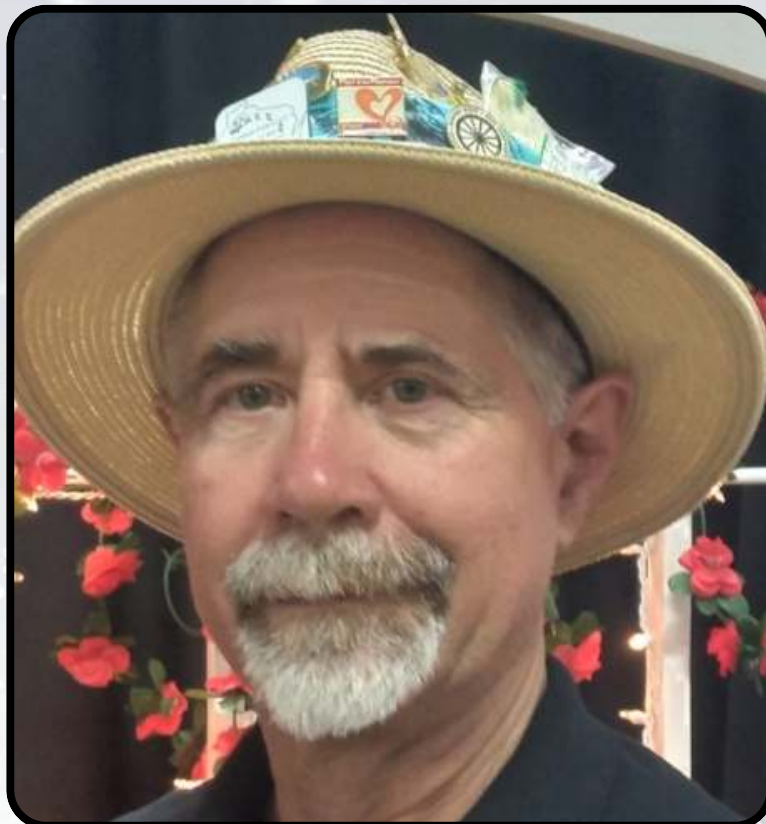

Elimination of Program Certificates

Hello FCRV Members,

During the February 15, 2026, Trustee Board Meeting, it was decided to eliminate the use of the Program Certificates.

This decision came about because the Certificates are an unknown financial liability as well as a to-do item for all the Program Directors. As you can imagine, if someone saves up their certificates and then uses them as intended to purchase an item from a vendor or towards their Campvention fee, FCRV then pays that vendor those amounts. Since FCRV is watching every penny, we are deciding to eliminate the certificates to avoid those surprising expenses.

Since we seem to have lots of these certificates sitting around, we are issuing this notice to allow you all sufficient time to use those well-deserved certificates. We really hope you use them while attending the 2026 or 2027 Campvention or towards the 2026 / 2027 Campvention registration fees.

The Certificates will no longer be printed and issued effective March 15, 2026.

You will then have until the end of the 2027 Campvention event, which is currently set to end on July 17, 2027, to use up all your Program Certificates.

We all hope you understand the need for this change and hope you enjoy the use of your Certificates!

Important Membership Dues Update

After extensive discussion among the Executive Board and Advisory Council, FCRV has approved an increase in annual dues. For at least the past 15 years, reserve funds have been used to cover annual operating expenses. While this approach allowed us to avoid increasing dues, it is no longer sustainable.

Even with the adjustment, the new dues rate will not fully cover our operating costs. However, increasing dues at this time is essential to keep FCRV financially solvent and able to continue serving its members. **It has been approximately 15 years since the last dues increase**, and we will continue to regularly evaluate dues and expenses going forward.

In addition to this change, we will actively pursue non-dues revenue opportunities to support long-term financial stability. The trustees are working diligently to ensure the organization's future, and we ask for the same level of commitment from our members.

Effective March 1, 2026:

- Annual dues will be **\$52** (equivalent to **\$1.00 per week**).
- Multiple-year discounts will no longer be offered; however, members may renew for multiple years at the rate of **\$52 per year**.
- Dues payments will be accepted **online only**, as part of a cost-saving and streamlining initiative.
- The six-month free bonus for new members is being discontinued; however, this change does not preclude the development and implementation of new, more tailored incentives or promotional offerings in the future as part of a more strategic and targeted membership approach.

We continue to evaluate every expense carefully. We appreciate your ongoing support, trust your commitment to FCRV, and welcome your input as we move forward together.

Note: Current dues rates will remain available for renewal until **February 28, 2026**.

NCHA/FCRV Hank Nathan International Scholarship 2026 Is Now Open!

Greetings from your Hank Nathan Scholarship Team.

Requests for applications will be posted in the December-April issues of *Camping Today*. The portal submission closes on May 1.

How to Apply:

Applications will only be accepted online at the following address: <https://fcrv.org/hank-nathan-ncha-fcrv-scholarship/>. The application MUST include the FCRV member holder's name, membership number, postal mailing address, and most importantly, an email address at which the applicant can be contacted. Pay special attention to the entire website and follow the directions closely.

- Section 1. Must be filled out by all applicants.
- Section 2. Is only for applicants graduating from high school this year and applying for a scholarship for the first time.
- Section 3. Is only for applicants currently enrolled and continuing their college education.
- Section 4. Applies to those returning to school for continuing or advanced education.

Eligibility Requirements:

- Parents, guardians, or applicants must be members of FCRV for 18 full calendar months or longer.
- Applicants must be enrolled, or accepted, into an accredited undergraduate, graduate, or trade school course of study.
- Part-time and trade school students must carry an equivalent of 11 credit hours or less. You will be evaluated accordingly.
- Applicants should have a minimum 2.3 GPA (grade point average) on a 4.0 point scale. All applicants are given equal consideration.
- A current, complete official transcript of grades must display student name, school name, grades, credit hours for each course, and terms in which the courses were taken.

Recommendations:

Two online recommendations are required and must be from a non-relative. Both may come from any FCRV member including trustees, regional director, state director, or non-elected member. Your second recommendation may come from a school official, coach, band director, club supervisor or an immediate supervisor if you are working. Your application will be complete when all required materials are submitted electronically on or before May 1. Scholarships are for one year. Recipients may reapply each year they meet the eligibility requirements. **If you've already submitted four letters of recommendation from 2 previous scholarship applications, those are still on file, and you do not need to submit any additional ones unless you want to include an update to your file.*

Scholarships

Annual Scholarships are non-competitive. That means there is no competition between applicants. Each applicant's score is individually tallied. A scholarship will be awarded to every applicant who meets the standards determined in advance by our rating scale. Scholarship values will range from \$1,000 to \$4,000+ (American). Scholarship values are determined each year by the controller in collaboration with the Scholarship Board of Directors.

Consideration is taken for GPA (Grade Point Average), maturity, leadership, related activities, and goals of the candidate as based on the objectives of FCRV. Special consideration is given to applicants who major, minor or explore elective classes in fields related to forestry, conservation, wildlife, ecology, or outdoor education training.

The Board of Directors will announce the recipients at or after the Annual General Meeting held at Campvention in Huron, South Dakota. All scholarship recipients will be posted in *Camping Today* so that the members who donate to the scholarship fund can see who is getting an FCRV Scholarship.

Applicants will be notified in writing as to the amount they will receive along with further instructions after May 1st.



Building a Visible Future for FCRV



From Hidden Secrets to National Presence: Building a Visible Future for FCRV

For organizations like FCRV (Family Campers & RVers), the path forward is no longer simply about maintaining strong internal programs, it is about actively communicating their value to the world. Visibility is no longer optional, it is foundational. Organizations that thrive today are those that step beyond their internal circles and intentionally make their mission visible to people who are already interested in camping, RVing, and outdoor community life, but who have not yet connected with membership.

FCRV already delivers meaningful programs, events, and community experiences that strengthen families, encourage outdoor engagement, and build lasting connections. However, too often these efforts remain “in-house,” shared mainly within existing membership rather than promoted outward in a coordinated way. This creates an unintended barrier: people who would naturally be interested in FCRV simply never see what it is doing. The organization is doing the work, but not consistently telling the story.

To change this, FCRV must adopt a national marketing mindset where every program, event, and activity is also treated as a public story. Every rally, safety workshop, youth activity, or educational seminar should be seen not only as an internal benefit, but as an opportunity to show the broader RV and camping community what FCRV looks like in action.

A national campaign approach can amplify local efforts through shared branding, social media, video storytelling, and partnerships with RV influencers and outdoor organizations. This does not replace local identity, it strengthens it by connecting individual efforts into a larger, visible national presence.

Equally important is integrating FCRV programs into the communities where they occur. When chapters partner with state parks, RV dealerships, tourism boards, outdoor retailers, and civic organizations, their activities gain reach, credibility, and visibility. A youth camping safety event or rally becomes far more powerful when it is co-hosted or promoted alongside established community partners.

A strong example of this approach can already be seen in the current National partnerships with the Maga Ta-Hohpi and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Huron, South Dakota for Campvention. These efforts show what is possible when FCRV steps outside its internal structure and engages external partners. More importantly, they serve as a blueprint that can be applied at every level, national, regional, state or provincial, and local chapters.

This is where a cultural shift is needed. Leadership must not only share what is happening, but actively guide members on how to expand visibility and partnerships in their own communities. Members should feel empowered to ask how they can get involved, contribute, and help build a stronger public presence for FCRV.

Just as importantly, this effort requires all of us working together. Please reach out to your leadership, whether state or provincial, regional, national program directors, or trustees, and ask how you can help make this happen. This is a learning process for nearly all of us, and it will take collaboration at every level to succeed.

Ultimately, FCRV must shift from “waiting to be found” to “actively being seen.” When its programs are consistently shared, partnered, and promoted outward, FCRV moves from a well-kept secret to a recognized, growing leader in the modern camping community.



Reduce Tent Condensation Overnight

Reduce Tent Condensation Overnight

Waking up to a damp tent ceiling or dripping walls is a common camping frustration, especially in cooler or humid weather.

Fortunately, there's a simple way to significantly reduce condensation inside your tent and stay drier through the night.

How it works

1. Always pitch your tent with maximum airflow in mind, even if it feels slightly less sheltered.
2. Keep vents open at the top and bottom of the tent to allow air circulation.
3. Avoid sealing up rain flies completely to the ground unless weather is severe.
4. If safe, leave a small gap in a door or window for cross ventilation.
5. Move wet gear, boots, and clothing outside the sleeping area before bed.

Why it works

- Condensation forms when warm, moist air gets trapped and hits cooler tent surfaces.
- Airflow helps equalize temperature and moisture levels inside the tent.
- Reducing internal humidity lowers the amount of water that can collect on the fabric.
- Keeping wet gear outside removes a major source of moisture buildup.

Pro tip

If conditions allow, set up a small mesh-only inner layer or use a ground tarp slightly smaller than your tent footprint. This improves airflow underneath and helps keep moisture from being trapped at the base.

Spring Driving Safety Reminder

Spring has sprung, and more and more people are driving all about. Now is an important time to take steps to make sure one is driving defensively as they travel. This is the perfect time to refresh our focus on safe, defensive driving habits. Taking a few moments to review the basics can help keep everyone in your vehicle safe.

The cars of today are much safer than yesterday. Think about our forefathers who traveled by wagon, and if they crashed, their chances of survival were slim. The various technologies of today have made cars and trucks safer over the years. Today many accidents are caused by driver error or speed. When driving, focus on what you are doing, and especially put down that cell phone. Many more accidents today are caused by individuals using a cell phone than a drunk driver.

For new drivers, professional instruction from a reputable driving school is highly recommended. Proper training builds awareness, teaches vehicle control, and emphasizes the importance of staying alert to your surroundings.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, there were over 6 million crashes in 2023, resulting in more than 41,000 fatalities. Speeding, impaired driving, and distractions remain leading causes. The Insurance Information Institute reports that crash-related insurance claims exceeded \$260 billion that same year.

Everyone is at risk. Help increase your ability to drive safely by considering taking a defensive driving course. This will sharpen your driving skills, and in some instances once you have successfully completed the course, it is possible in some

instances your insurance rate may drop a few dollars.

Key Defensive Driving Tips:

- Know your vehicle and how it handles
- Keep both hands on the wheel (9 and 3 position)
- Stay alert and scan your surroundings constantly
- Be aware of blind spots and adjust mirrors properly
- Maintain a safe following distance (at least 4 seconds)
- Anticipate other drivers' actions and use turn signals
- Adjust for weather and road conditions
- Use your vehicle's safety technology wisely
- Never drive under the influence or while fatigued

The above reminders are for all drivers. The better prepared you are, the safer you will be while traveling. Wishing everyone safe travels this summer.

Iceland-Adventure-Horses

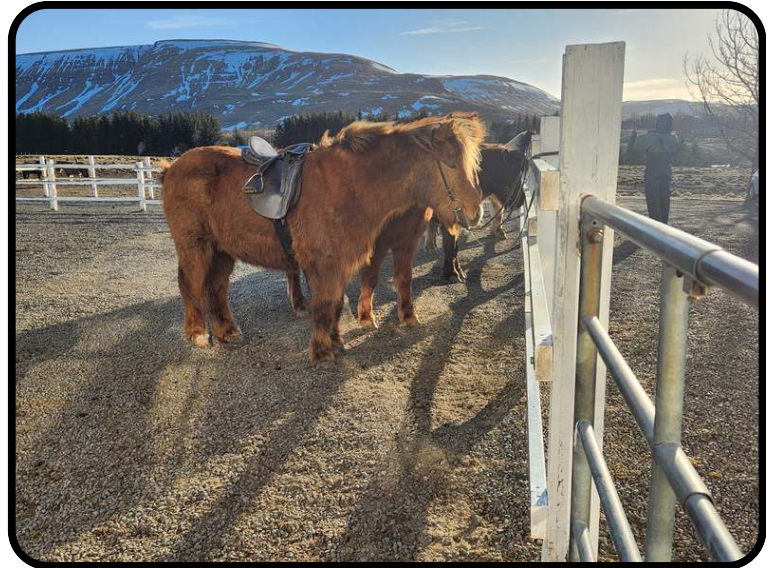

Icelandic horses are, literally, one of a kind. The first horses were brought to the island in the 9th & 10th centuries by the Nordic settlers. Survival of the fittest was essential in the harsh climate conditions and the difficulty of getting the correct nourishment from the rocky land. Due to these conditions, the Icelandic horse has developed into a hardy, disease resistant breed with the hardest of them passing on their genes to future generations.

Icelandic horses are small when compared to the horses we are used to seeing and/or riding in North America. They are not much larger than what we would consider “pony-size”, but they are, indeed, horses and NOT ponies. Icelandic horses are gorgeous. In the winter, they have long shaggy fur and a double mane. Most are extremely friendly and love being around us humans.

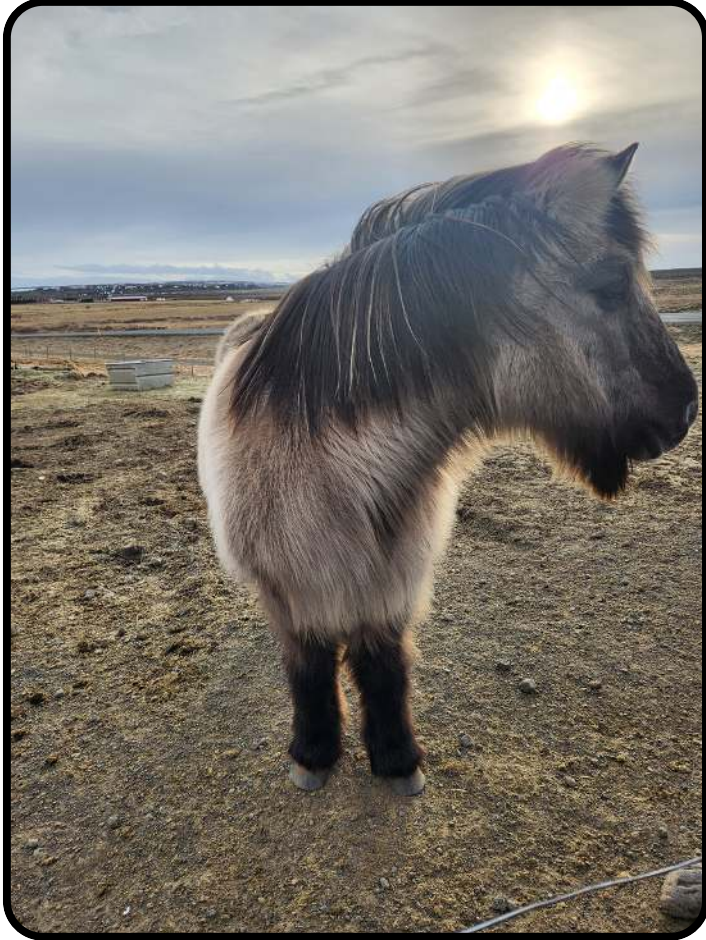
In Iceland, horses are used as they are all over the world. Some are used in farming and as draft horses. Some are bred for racing which is very popular. Some are bred specifically for riding, and some are bred only as future horsemeat.....yes, the Icelandic people eat horses. I personally did not try any, although I am usually adventurous when it comes to trying new foods.

We know that horses have specific gaits. They walk, trot, canter and gallop. Icelanders consider the canter and gallop as one gait. The Icelandic horse has an additional gait called “tolt”. The tolt is similar to a fast walk and has the ability to cover ground at astonishing speeds, anywhere from a fast walk to a canter. It is (supposedly, I didn't try it

out) very comfortable for the rider.

The Icelandic horse is a registered breed. There are approximately 80,000 horses living in Iceland and 100,000 living in other countries. Once an Icelandic horse leaves the island, it is NEVER allowed to return. This keeps the breed pure and keeps disease down because they are not exposed.

So, we went horseback riding. It was about 2 ½ hours long, and I was not at all comfortable. I am used to horses and had ridden recently, but the horses in Iceland use an English-style saddle!!! This is a very small saddle and has no saddle horn to help mount/dismount or hold onto if the horse stumbles. I did not feel safe and secure but loved the scenery on the ride, which was kept mostly at a walk/fast walk. We forded streams and crossed highways with a group of about 10 riders. It was a beautiful, sunny afternoon, perfect for horseback riding. Just a tidbit of useless information here: It was my 70th birthday, and I was thrilled that I was in another country riding a beautiful horse, viewing beautiful scenery on a beautiful day. It was the perfect birthday gift to myself, and I enjoyed every minute of that day.

Oh wait....it wasn't ended just yet...Later that night we looked out the hotel window and saw the Northern Lights! Happy Birthday to me!

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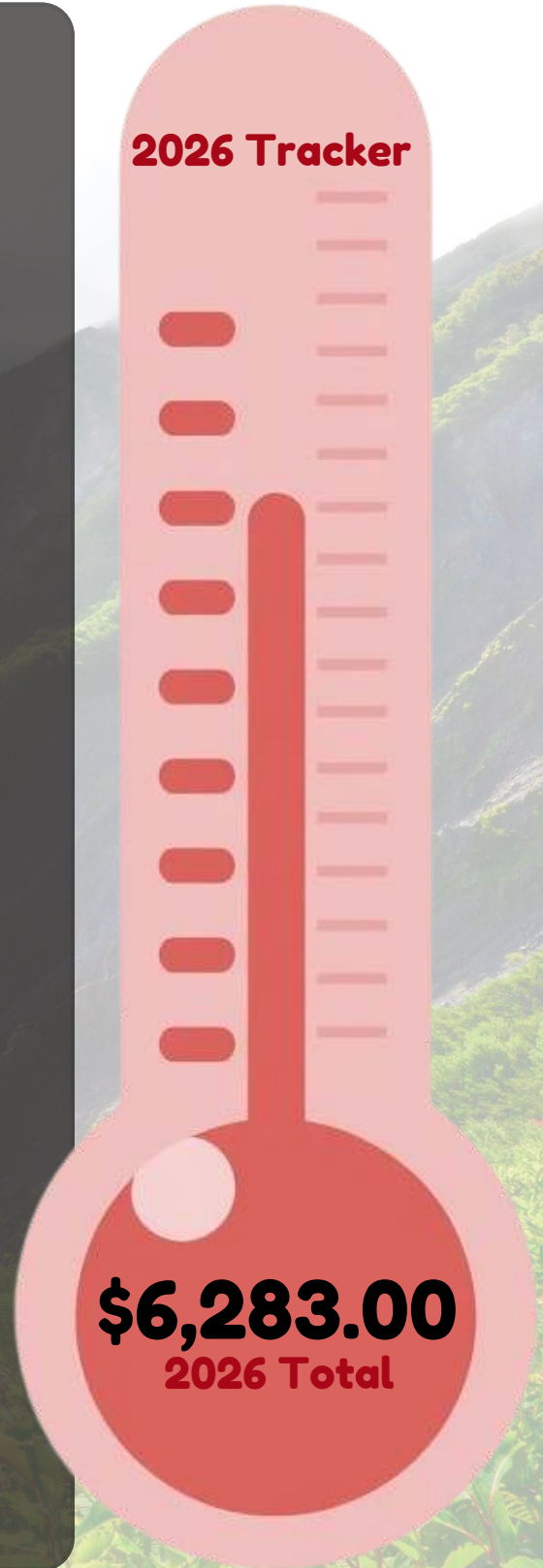
